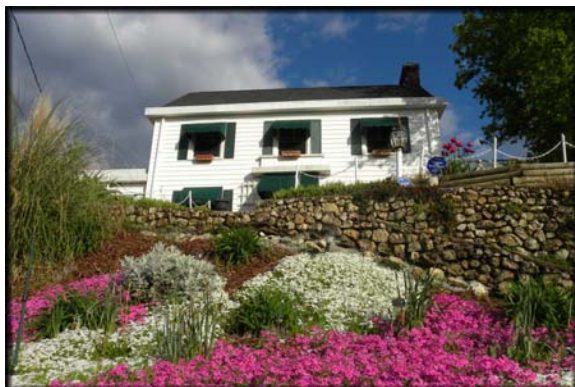


470 South Crest Road 1.7 miles from Fire Hall



This Colonial 3-story home, built around 1920, was recently featured in the Chattanooga Times Free Press showcasing the owner's love of collecting antiques. Danny Gilbert, owner, discovered auctions a few years ago as a way to furnish his home.

Parking is available on the opposite side of East View Ave., which is behind the house. Look for tour signs and the number 470.

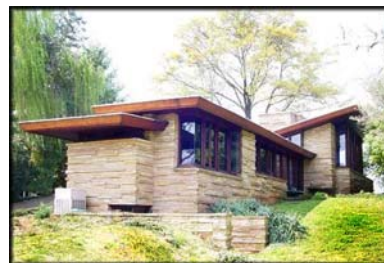
About Missionary Ridge And other places to see



Drive all or part of the 9-plus miles of Missionary Ridge to enjoy seeing the homes and the panoramic views of Chattanooga.

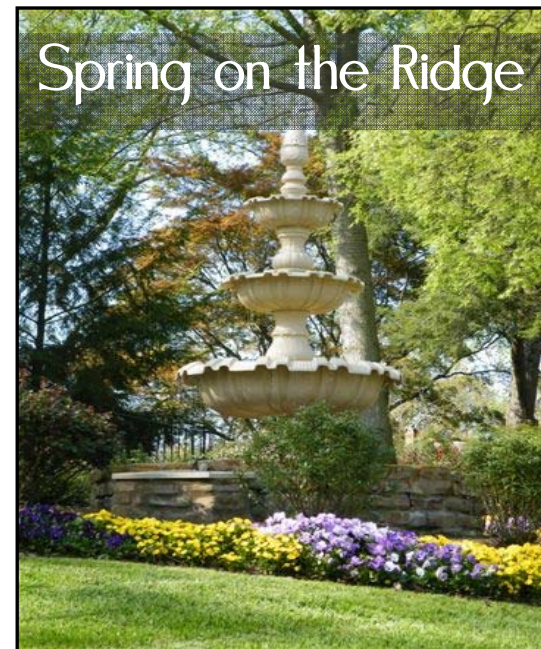
The only building designed by Frank Lloyd Wright in Tennessee is the home at 334 North Crest Road. Commissioned by newlyweds Seamour and Gerte Shavin in 1949, it was completed in 1952.

Both the exterior and interior of the house use red cypress and Tennessee Crab Orchard stone.

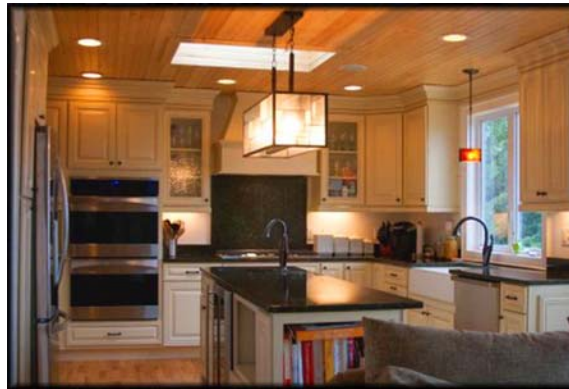
Missionary Ridge's "Story Book Cottage" is a 1927 Dutch Colonial home patterned after the "Glen Falls" style, a mail order house featured in the Sears and Roebuck Catalogue of the 1920's. For almost 10 years owners, Charles and Beth Myers, have transformed the grounds into elegant story book gardens!

A front English Garden is filled with roses, hydrangeas and arborvitaes. A side arbor beckons the visitor to enjoy enchanting water features and rock walls creatively displaying picturesque murals shaded by a pergola of spring and summer blooms. Birds are drawn to the hillside garden located in the back yard by bird houses, baths, and feeders. The visitor will want to linger a while in this artistic garden and perhaps catch a glimpse of a garden fairy.

This 1950's Cape Cod brick home holds architectural surprises created by owners, Justin and Kristi Stringfield. Upon entering the home, the visitor is drawn through an open living/dining room to the family room with large windows framing the view of distant mountains. Off the family room is the impressive new kitchen, featuring cabinets with an antiqued finish and granite counter tops.

A Mondrian inspired light fixture hangs above the island. The owners have put their heart and soul into this restoration with a professional look.

A large second floor observation deck will lure one outside to admire an awesome panoramic view. Come see the three year renovation project. This house is an inspiration for the creative!

The home owner, Janet Bean, considers herself a steward honoring the historical integrity of this gorgeous home. It was built in 1894 by J.A.Wiley, owner of Mountain City Business College, later becoming MacKenzie College. This elegant Queen Anne Victorian home features a gabled roof, a curved wrap-around veranda, heart pine floors, massive pocket doors and gracious front staircase.

During restoration five layers of mostly pink wallpaper were discovered. Today this grand Victorian lady sports a pink porch ceiling, a foyer covered with pink cabbage rose wallpaper, and a raspberry pink living room. Decorating this home proves that if one attempts bold, creative choices, the results can be unique and beautiful.

Outside garden venues abound by a series of paths and steps, designed by the owner, leading to a variety of seasonal color. The azalea-covered bank is a gift to South Crest each spring.
